

GLENDALE HEIGHTS POLICE DEPARTMENT 2010 ANNUAL REPORT

March 1, 2011

Village President Linda Jackson and Board of Trustees,

Village Ordinance, section 10-1-9-4, requires the Chief of Police to provide the Village President and Board of Trustees with an annual report on the status of the Police Department. To that end my staff and I have prepared this annual report for calendar year 2010.

Accreditation

The Glendale Heights Police Department was accredited by the Commission on the Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) in December of 2008. A major goal of the Department and the Village is to retain accreditation and during 2010 the Police Department has been working to that end. Orders and Procedures are reviewed and updated on a regular basis and proofs of compliance are routinely collected and filed in preparation for the 2011 reassessment which is now only 6 months away. This process is important to the community as it ensures our residents that the Glendale Heights Police Department is following the best practices in the law enforcement profession.



Crime Statistics

The majority of the pages in this report deal with the crime statistics in Glendale Heights and the activities of the Police Department. These statistics were compiled by Police Services Specialist Maureen Pope and Police Records Supervisor Patrick McDonald.

Part I crimes are those that are most serious in nature and include, Murder, Robbery, Burglary, Theft, Aggravated Assault and Battery. There was a decrease in Part I crimes 2010, 7.1%, compared to last year and a 24.2% decrease since 2005. There were 625 Part 1 crimes in 2010 compared to 673 in 2009. In 2010, 21.0% of Part I crimes resulted in an arrest compared with 23.0% in 2009 and 23.8% in 2008.

In 2009 Robbery, showed a 37.5% increase. A disturbing trend as a majority these robberies were occurring in neighborhoods and apartment complex parking lots. The Department tracked these incidents, made resource adjustments and conducted surveillances in an attempt to combat the robberies. The randomness of the locations frustrated our efforts and no arrest was made as a result of adjustments. In 2010, Robberies were back to the previous average, with only 12 occurring, representing a 45.5% reduction.

Part II crimes are less serious, but equally important. Part II crimes include Criminal Damage to Property, Deceptive Practice, Forgery, Liquor Law Violations, Identity Theft, Internet Crime and most Class A Misdemeanor Traffic Offenses. Part II crimes decreased by 36% this year as compared to the

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previous year. The clearance rate, by arrest, for Part II crimes in 2010 was 58% compared with 47.9% in 2009 and 41.4% in 2008.

Despite the overall reduction in the number of index crimes there was a slight increase in the number of calls for service in the Village. Calls for service include all calls to the Police Department for which a police report number is generated.

Police Activities

The Police Department conducts other activities that are not included in the calls for service. These are activities for which police report numbers are not generated. Anti-gang watches were down 18.5% after an increase in 2009 of 23.2%; Bar Checks were lower by 14.5% after a 36.4% increase in 2009; Extra Watches were lower by 16.5%, Traffic Stops were lower by 7%, Special Traffic Enforcement Zone Patrols were lower by 2.9% and there was a reduction in the number of foot patrols conducted of 10.2%. When combined with the calls for service, there was a 8.9% decrease in police activity as compared to 2009.

In 2010 the Police Department experienced a number of extended Family and Medical Leaves by members of the patrol and investigations divisions as well as not filling two open positions due to budgetary constraints. Given this fact it would be expected that the activities enumerated above would show a decrease in activity. The activities above are conducted when there is unobligated patrol time. An increase in calls for service from the public as well as fewer personnel to handle those calls, results in less unobligated time for officers to conduct these discretionary activities.

Major investigations in 2010 included:

- **\$1 Million Theft** – Specialty Moving systems reported that over the course of a six year period nearly \$1.2 million had been removed from the accounts of Specialty Moving Systems. After an extensive investigation it was determined that employee, Tammy R. Weart, 52 of 548 Anita Street, Des Plaines was allegedly responsible for the theft. In December, a 30 count indictment for theft and a variety of other fraud related charges was handed down by the DuPage County Grand Jury and Weart was eventually arrested and held on \$1million bond; she is currently awaiting trial.
- **Armed Robbery** - On June 14, 2010 at 12:06:00 AM Glendale Heights police responded to the 1400 block of Westchester Drive for a report of a man who had been stabbed. A nineteen year old Glen Ellyn resident was found lying in a driveway with an apparent stab wound in the abdomen. He reported he was stabbed after an unknown suspect approached and attempted to rob him at the intersection of Armitage Avenue and Chapman Court. He resisted and a struggle ensued during which he was stabbed one time. The suspect then fled east on foot after taking

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currency from the victim. The victim was transported to GlenOaks Hospital in Glendale Heights by Glenside Fire Department for treatment of non life threatening injuries. We are still looking

- for a black male, approximately 5'10" tall with a thin build, short black hair, and wearing a red baseball cap, red shirt, and dark jeans at the time of the offense.

- Abduction - On Thursday, February 25, 2010 at approximately 9:45 a.m., a 30 year old Glendale Heights man was abducted from his vehicle as he was driving w/b on North Brandon Drive at Aspen Lane. According to witnesses, the victim's vehicle was forced to the curb by a white, Plymouth Voyager with a thin red stripe down the side, bearing IL registration #K109985. At that point, two unidentified Hispanic males approximately 30 years old, wearing dark colored hooded jackets, exited the Voyager and told the victim they were the police and ordered him to go with them. The victim was then handcuffed by the two men, placed in their vehicle and driven away from the area e/b on North Brandon. No weapon was reportedly implied or displayed. The victim was eventually returned, unharmed however the victim has left the country and this case remains unsolved.

- Reckless Discharge of a Firearm - On 2/24/2010 at 8:32PM Glendale Heights Police were called to GlenOaks Hospital, 701 Winthrop Ct., Glendale Heights, IL for a report of a shooting victim who was brought into the Emergency Department. The victim, 19 years old, of the 2700 block of South California Ave., Chicago, IL suffered a gunshot wound to his foot. Investigation revealed the shooting took place inside an apartment in the 470 block of Gregory Ave., Glendale Heights, IL. The portion of that area was secured for approximately one hour, and several apartments evacuated as a precaution until the apartment was entered by members of the DuPage County Sheriff's Department SWAT team -at which time residents were allowed to return. The resident of the apartment and suspect, Ricardo Hernandez, 21 years old of the 470 Block of Gregory Avenue, Glendale Heights was subsequently located at another location and taken into custody without incident. Police also recovered a pistol believed to have been used in the shooting. It is alleged that Hernandez accidentally shot Rivera in the foot while handling the gun in his apartment. The DuPage County State's Attorney's Office was contacted and Hernandez was charged with felony counts of Reckless Discharge of a Firearm, and Possession of a Firearm with an Obliterated Serial Number.

- Aggravated Battery – On September 23, 2010 two men entered a home in the 400 block of Sidney Ave. and severely beat a resident of the home. After an investigation Nello Pacillo of Westchester and Joseph Galione of Addison were arrested and charged with Aggravated Battery. Allegedly the two beat the resident for failing to repay a loan that had been made to the victim by one of the arrestee's sister.

- Armed Robbery – On 02/26/10 at 1907 hrs, the suspect described below entered Miska's, 365 E. North Ave, jumped the counter and demanded money from the employee's at gunpoint. He then took cash out of the male employee's pocket and out of the cash register and fled from the store. The subject was last seen walking N/B on Newton being followed by an older model, dark

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colored medium sized boxy vehicle (possibly a Chrysler) with the right front headlight out. Moments later, the same vehicle was seen leaving the area S/B on Newton.

- Aggravated Battery - 194 Internationale - On 08/30/10 at about 1336 hrs, Glenside paramedics were dispatched to the business for an employee who was feeling ill. The employee advised he was having trouble breathing. According to the general manager, other employees had been complaining the coffee had an unusual odor to it. Prior to feeling ill, the employee reportedly opened a plastic container of coffee in the employee lounge and smelled it, thereafter, he began to feel ill and the FD was contacted. He was subsequently transported to Glen Oaks Hospital and later released. He has since returned to work. Following this incident, the general manager stated he began looking into how the coffee became contaminated. On 09/02/10 at approximately 0845 hrs, an employee entered the business through an east entrance, he looked down and observed several sheets of paper on the ground outside the door with a message indicating that the coffee had been tainted. The Police Department is working in cooperation with the Secret Service and although suspects have been developed, there are no charges forthcoming at this time.
- Armed Robbery – Check Into Cash, 1171 Bloomingdale Rd. Employees reported on 12/24/10 at approximately 1515 hrs. a male black subject came into the business and walked around the counter on the south-side. The subject had a black book bag strapped across his shoulder. The subject pulled a black gun from the bag and said "Give me the money". The subject reached in and took out the money out of the cash drawer before fleeing the scene. This case is still under investigation.

Traffic

There was a 7% decrease in the number of traffic stops made by the Department and 5% fewer traffic tickets issued compared with 2009, the number of DUI arrests were down 9, a 5.3% reduction, and class A misdemeanor traffic arrests showed an 8.3% reduction, after a 10.3% increase in 2009. Class A misdemeanor arrests are for No Valid Driver's License and Driving with a Suspended or Revoked Driver's License.

The number of traffic accidents in the Village had dropped for three years in a row, dipping solidly below 1,000 in 2009. The total number of reported accidents in 2010 was 1037, a 10.8% increase. The number of accidents involving an injury decreased by 18.3% which returned us to 2008 numbers. It continues to be a goal of the Police Department to decrease the number of accidents through enforcement and education.

There were four fatal accidents in 2010, up from the two fatal accidents in 2009. This follows a two year period of no fatal accidents.

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- On June 26, 2010 at approximately 1:50 PM, an intoxicated motorcyclist lost control of his vehicle in the 100 block of North Avenue and crashed into the concrete barrier just off the shoulder of the roadway; the driver was pronounced dead on the scene.
- On July 29, 2010 at 9:15 PM the driver of a 2005 black infinity lost control of his vehicle while travelling at a high rate of speed S/B on Schmale Rd. just south of the Canadian National railway tracks. The vehicle slid under the trailer portion of a tractor/trailer combination that was exiting Longview Drive. The driver of the infinity was pronounced dead on the scene.
- On November 9, 2010 at approximately 9:40 PM a 51 year old female was crossing North Avenue in the 700 block, when she was struck by a Freightliner semi tractor. She was pronounced dead at Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove. In all three of these accidents it was determined that the decedent was at fault in the accident and no tickets were issued.
- The fourth fatal accident occurred on September 5, 2010 at 9:30 AM at North Ave. and Bloomingdale Rd. when the driver of a westbound vehicle made a left turn against the red signal and struck an eastbound vehicle. A passenger in the backseat of the westbound vehicle sustained multiple internal injuries and died several days later from the injuries sustained in the accident. The driver of the westbound vehicle was cited for disobeying the traffic control device.

The intersection of Bloomingdale and North Avenue claimed the top spot for traffic accidents in 2010 with 33 accidents. This was followed closely by Bloomingdale Road and Army Trail Road with 29 accidents. The Department will continue to identify and implement methods to decrease the number of accidents in the Village. It is important that motorists and pedestrians can safely navigate our roadways.

Traffic Stop Statistical Study

The State of Illinois is in the seventh year of collecting data on traffic stops made by police officers throughout the State. The data is analyzed each year by the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety to determine if minority drivers are being stopped at a higher rate than white drivers. Our 2010 data indicates that white drivers in Glendale Heights account for 60.1% of all traffic stops and represent 58.9% of the driving population. These percentages indicate that white drivers are slightly overrepresented in our stops in proportion to their driving population. Therefore non-white drivers are underrepresented. This study is becoming less valid the later in the decade we get, as the driving populations are still based on the 2000 census. Per the latest legislation, the study is slated to end in 2014. The Glendale Heights Police Department has a strict policy which prohibits racial profiling on traffic stops and all racially biased policing.

Communications

In 2010 the Communications Center handled 15,496 emergency calls for service as well as 35,124 non-emergency and administrative calls. During the course of the year, telecommunicators are tasked with making a number of phone calls to tow companies, other agencies and a myriad of other calls in support of the police officer on the street. There were 22,812 of these outgoing phone calls for a total number

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of calls handled in the Communications Center of 73,432; that averages a call going into or out of the Communications Center every 7.2 minutes. This represents a reduction in the call volume of 3.3% in the Communications Center. When considering the workload in the room, one must also take into consideration the radio traffic. The Police Department takes measures to ensure that the quality of the call taking in the Center is maintained. Supervisors make random checks of the tapes to ensure quality. Given the capacity handled by our Communications Center, it is easy to see why we have struggled to maintain full staffing in the room. In 2008 the Department began utilizing a different testing process in an effort to hire candidates that will be able to handle the stress and multitasking necessary to be a successful telecommunicator. We utilized this software to assist in hiring our newest telecommunicators who have progressed well through the training program and have successfully transitioned to working solo in the room. The Communications Center is operating with one open position.

Use of Force

The Department's review of its Use of Force for 2010 showed an increase of 3 reported incidents. There were 36 reports of force being used against arrestees compared to 33 last year; based on the 18,683 incidents handled, that is a .19% rate of force used per incidents handled. This is a nominal increase from last year's rate of .18%. In the 36 use of force incidents, 41 individuals were involved. Of those 41 individuals, 14 reported they were injured during the incident. Of those 14 individuals, 10 were transported to the hospital for treatment. Of the 10 transported, 3 individuals were kept in the hospital; two for a psychological evaluation and one due to their level of intoxication. Twenty-five of the individuals, or 61%, whom force was used against were under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. In 2010, three officers sustained minor injuries as a result of these 36 uses of force incidents.

Each use of force is reviewed by the immediate supervisor and then by a Use of Force Review Board to determine whether or not the force used was objectively reasonable, complied with State Law and Department Policy. All uses of force were determined to be within the law and Department policy.

Training

The Glendale Heights Police Department continues to make training its officers a top priority. Police Officers are given the authority by law to take a person's freedom away and in extreme cases are authorized to take a life if necessary. No other profession has the power afforded to the Police. It is important that Police Officers are consistently trained and kept up to date on new laws and techniques and are refreshed on skills not used often but that are necessary. To continue the training process the Department established a training committee within the Department to identify training needs and curriculum that will keep officers fully trained professionals. The Training Committee has developed a training program that schedules training through the next several years to ensure that our officers and



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employees remain highly trained. In 2010 nearly 3,500 hours were spent in some form of training, which ranged from Management Training, language, Defensive Tactics, tactical response, NIMS training, traffic enforcement, DUI enforcement, new laws, policies and procedures training, among other topics. A well trained police department is essential to providing quality law enforcement service to the community.

Community Involvement

In 2010, the Police Department continued to participate and facilitate events that reach out to the public to foster community involvement. School Resource Officers conducted hundreds of D.A.R.E. and G.R.E.A.T. classes in our primary and middle schools. The Department also ran five, week long, Safety Town classes. In addition, members of the Department conducted the 6th annual Jr. Police Academy, designed for 5th through 8th graders. Students are exposed to a variety of police training that includes, testing to be a police officer, evidence work, and making traffic stops.



The Department continues to stay in touch with the community through the Neighborhood Watch program. Meetings are held on the 4th Wednesday of every month in the Council Chambers. Attendees are shown a presentation which includes a synopsis of crimes that occurred during the past month and are treated to guest speakers. Through Neighborhood Watch meetings trouble spots in the Village come to light.

The Department implements the CODE RED emergency community notification system. This system allows the Police Department and the Village to notify the residents of emergencies that may be occurring in the Village. It can do a Village – wide notification or can be tailored to specific areas, depending on the incident. This system is also used to do well-being check phone calls to our senior citizen population during extreme weather situations.



Members of the Police Department attended numerous park parties and many neighborhood block parties during the year. In August, the Department threw the largest block party of the year at Camera Park, in honor of National Night Out. Free hamburgers, hot dogs and beverages were distributed to those residents attending. There were booths with information to increase awareness of crime, McGruff the crime dog made an appearance, the Illinois Treasurer's Office set up shop to help residents check for their names on the unclaimed funds registry and the Glenside Fire Department brought some of their apparatus for display. Munters Moisture Control sponsored a shredding event at National Night Out again this year and the Boy Scouts set up a computer recycling station to encourage safe disposal of computers. The event was attended by over 400 residents.

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A Citizens Police Academy was conducted from March through May and twelve residents graduated at a banquet in their honor in May. We hope interest continues for this program into the coming years. The Police Department continues to take advantage of the Village's web site and the skills of the Public Relations Department to better communicate with the public. Crime alerts are posted and press releases are available on the Police Department's site. We have posted the annual report on the site to continue to inform residents of what is occurring in their community. We have found this to be a valuable tool in working in partnership with the community. We began conducting an on-line community survey in December, to measure the Departments performance in the eyes of its residents. Results should be available in the first quarter of 2011.

Major Accomplishments

In addition to the CALEA project, and dealing with day to day operations, the Police Department initiated and completed several important projects during 2010.

- The Police Department received funding from the Village Board to begin the design phase for an addition to the Civic Center that would house a new Police Facility. Schematic design began in late 2009 and in 2010 design of the building was completed as well as the construction documents. The groundbreaking for the project was held on November 18, 2010 and construction is expected to be completed in the first half of 2012.
- Early in 2009 the Village established the Citizen Corps Council which cleared the way for the establishment of the Villages CERT group. The Police Department held its first Citizen's Emergency Response Team training class in 2009. In 2010 the Department held one additional classes training 8 more residents in emergency preparedness.
- The Police Department teamed up with Glenbard School District 87 to sponsor an Alcohol Awareness program for parents. The program was held at Glendale Heights Village Hall and was attended by speakers from the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists, the Illinois Secretary of State Police and States Attorney Joe Birkett. The program was well attended.
- The Emergency Management Coordinator and the Police Department concluded a revision of the Emergency Operations Plan which satisfied our State mandated requirement to review our Emergency Operations Plan biennially.
- The Department initiated and co-sponsored a presentation at Glenbard East High School of a mock fatal vehicle crash in April of 2010, just before prom and graduation season. The program was held in the football stadium and was attended by every high school senior at Glenbard East. The program consisted of staging a vehicle accident which included student actors as victims and included one being suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol. The program demonstrated the consequences of drinking and driving to the students in graphic form. The students were fully engaged in this program and one could have heard a pin drop as the coroner explained the emotional aftermath for parents and siblings. We received amazing inter-departmental cooperation from the Glenside Fire Protection District, Lombard Police Department and Lombard Fire Protection District. We are planning to present this program at all high schools in which Glendale Heights students attend, working with the host jurisdiction.

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Grants

The Glendale Heights Police Department was the recipient of 6 grants having a total value of nearly \$24,000. The majority of these grants were reimbursement grants which means the funds must be expended before the grant money is released to the Department; one was an equipment grant. The grants received are:

- Illinois Department of Transportation DUI MAP Grant which, reimburses overtime for officers dedicated to DUI enforcement.
- Bulletproof Vest Partnership from the Federal Government, which shares the cost for bulletproof vests and ballistic equipment for our officers.
- State of Illinois Tobacco Grant, which reimburses expenses in the enforcement of retail sale of tobacco products to minor laws.
- CERT grant which provided funds for the start up of the Citizens Emergency Response Team.

The Department applied for grants for hiring a police officer, for construction of an Emergency Operations Center and for mobile video equipment. The value of these grants was \$755,024. Unfortunately, these were highly competitive grants with limited available funds and we did not meet the funding source's criteria. We currently have one grant that is still pending for traffic calming devices with a total value of \$32,290. The Police Department continues to identify all alternative funding sources possible that will help the Department complete its mission.

As we begin 2011, the Police Department is assessing its goals from 2010 and developing new goals for the coming year. Two major goals in 2011 will be to continue the work on the new Police Facility and reaccreditation in November. 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




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
CALLS FOR SERVICE SUMMARY




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
CALLS FOR SERVICE BY DAY




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

2010 Felony Arrests




2010 Misdemeanor Arrests
